Week of Prayer for International Missions

Read below for a preview of suggested prayer topics. Visit the church's Facebook page for more information about each need.

Day 1: The Naivasha Children's Shelter in Naivasha, Kenya, provides a safe place for boys who would otherwise be living on the dangerous streets. The shelter workers seek to reunite them with their families.

Day 2: In an area of Croatia with 250,000 people and only one Baptist church, Eric Maroney works with a team to broadcast an evangelistic program, which airs twice a week and reaches more than 40,000 people.

Day 3: Doug Derbyshire has been faithfully visiting Baan Po as a medical missionary for the last six years. After trying every evangelism technique he knew, there was still no church in Baan Po. His last visit in January 2020 sparked new hope as three patients made decisions of faith.

Day 4: Farmers harvest fish from a pond built to provide a sustainable livelihood for 11 indigenous missionary families. IMB missionary Joe Brewster and his team partner with indigenous missionaries in Peru to engage unreached tribes with the gospel.

Day 5: Throughout their 175-year history, Southern Baptists have maintained an uninterrupted witness among the nations, in time of famine, war, and civil unrest. This commitment has not come without sacrifice.

Day 6: Working alongside Italian and US partners, the Worthys bring the gospel to areas of Italy with little to no evangelical witness by strategically placing partnering groups in areas of Italy where churches do not exist.

Day 7: For 20 years, the IMB worked to maintain a gospel presence among the Khaleela, a Muslim people group in South Asia. After years of setbacks, Luciano and Sofia Serrano moved to the region and are now discipling a woman from the Khaleela who decided to follow Christ.

Day 8: IMB missionaries say thank you to Southern Baptists who give generously so that the gospel spreads to all nations.

We Wait with Hope and Long for Christ's Return

Each year during Advent, we celebrate Christ's birth and anticipate His return.

"O come, O come, Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here, Until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel." O COME O COME

The lyrics of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" serve a dual purpose, aptly applying both to Israel's hope for Christ's first coming and also our hope as we await His second coming. As we remember Christ's birth this Advent season, we long for His return. We celebrate the new life in Christ we have, yet we still hope for a place with no more grief, no more pain, no more death. Through the promise of salvation, this hope will be fulfilled at His return (Rev. 21:4: He will wipe away every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; grief, crying, and pain will be no more, because the previous things have passed away).

Perhaps early on in your walk with Jesus, you, like me, had thoughts similar to these when thinking about Christ's return: But wait — first, I want to go on my vacation next week. I want to go to college. I want to get married and have kids and grandkids. I want to do all the things you (older Christians) have been able to do before Jesus comes back. As faith matures, though, our understanding of heaven develops to a deeper comprehension that goes beyond worldly desires. But now, why do we primarily want Jesus to return? Is it the yearning to be reunited with family members? The hungering for a world of peace? While it's true and good that we may look forward to all these things, we must remember not to place them above the simple yet primary longing to be with Christ forever, worshiping Him.

We can't celebrate His first coming this Advent season without also being ready to celebrate His second coming above all else. We rejoice because God is with us, indwelling us with His Holy Spirit and fully knowing us as His children. Yet we "eagerly wait" (Phil. 3:20) for the day when the Light of the world will come to eradicate darkness and fully reveal the glory of God to us "face to face" (1 Cor. 13:12: For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror, but then face to face. Now I know in part, but then I will know fully, as I am fully known).

So because we know the rest of the story, we can share the rest of the story. Not only is Advent a time of celebrating and rejoicing in the present with our brothers and sisters in Christ, but it's also a time to share the gospel hope with those who don't yet know His redeeming love personally. The purpose of His birth, death, and resurrection is so that all who believe in Him can be saved before His return to earth as King, when perfect justice and judgment will be enacted (John 3:16; Matt. 25:31-46).

The reality of the goodness found in walking with Emmanuel's guiding light and wisdom leads to a desire to share this good news with all people — so that each can say with profound hope and faith, "O come, O come, Emmanuel!"

Missionary Moments—The Averills in Scotland

Every Christmas season since they have served in Scotland, Jerry and Elizabeth Averill have created a live production depicting the birth of Jesus. *The Dundee Nativity* will look a little different this year. With no live performances of The Dundee Nativity this year because of COVID restrictions, the Averills, along with a partnership with the inter-church Dundee Nativity Steering Group and Platform Arts, will be professionally filming the play. An online launch night is being planned where charities, care homes, churches, and other organizations will have small gatherings to watch the film as part of a larger celebration. The Dundee Nativity will be available on YouTube and Vimeo, as well as on DVDs and memory sticks, so that churches and other places of worship may watch and share the great news of Jesus' birth.

Dundee Nativity—The Movie: Celebrating a Covid Christmas is a musical comedy on film, by local Dundee artists and volunteers. It is presented with an entertaining and relevant slant on the events of the first Christmas, told through this year's unusual circumstances because of Covid-19. The movie aims to bring a message of hope, encouragement, and reassurance to all who are struggling with the situation. Through drama, music, and dance, the celebration of Christmas is presented in a way that is funny and thought-provoking for people of all ages.

The official launch date is December 11, 2020. Please pray as this project is cast, rehearsed, filmed, edited, and distributed. Pray that God would keep Covid at bay throughout the production process. Pray that the film will reach more people than a live production would have. A photo from a recent promotional photo shoot is included. Again, continue to pray for the actors and film crew as they film and record the audio.

Missionary Moments—The Fleming Family in Japan

Plans have changed... Corona has put us all into a very unpredictable season even under the best circumstances. But what about when you're a missionary, trying to renew your visas, pass your language evaluations, and plan your first stateside assignment? God has been teaching us a lot about patience, flexibility, and trust as this year has made all those things uncertain. We take great comfort in knowing that none of this has surprised God and He has been guiding us throughout the process. So what has changed for us?

We are no longer on track to return to the United States for 6 months starting in December. The original plan was to reach our required language level within year three of our first term and then return to America for 6 months for what our company calls "stateside assignment." But, Japanese is hard. And it's taking longer than we planned to learn enough to complete all our requirements. Compounding this, the pandemic forced us to move our language classes to the dreaded online learning format and it cut down on our overall interactions with Japanese people. The good news is that we have gone back to meeting with our teachers in person and we are having small gatherings with friends again. Our church is meeting in person every week and we are even having some outreach events again. Our language is steadily improving, but we now plan to stay here in Osaka until we reach the required language level and complete a few other necessary steps. So probably August 2021.

In the mean time, we are going to spend some time with our families this holiday season in America for bereavement and rest. Instead of the 6 months we had planned, we will only be able to come home for 6 weeks. Please pray for our church here in Osaka to continue to grow and be healthy while we are away. Pray that both the church and our team of missionaries as they continue the work of advancing the Gospel to the Japanese people and ministering to our friends.

For this shorter trip, getting from Japan to America is the easy part. The return trip is where we really need your prayers. The Japanese government is very strict when in comes to allowing Americans to return even if you have a valid visa and residency. All 5 of us need to test negative for Corona within 72 hours of our departing flight. Then, upon arrival in Japan, we have to test negative again. We will then be required to quarantine for two weeks without using public transportation (which is required to get us home to Osaka). So if the rules don't relax by January, we could be stuck in Tokyo or at the very least incur some expensive rental car fees to get us home. We are believing that God can work all this out and we ask that you pray for Him to do so. We would ask that you also pray especially that we would not contract the virus while in America. Not only would it put our families at risk, but it would make returning to our ministry in Japan an even greater challenge.

Looking at 2020 so far, I am overwhelmingly thankful. Our church recently had to move into a larger facility due to social distancing limitations, but now we have filled that building up with new visitors and friends that are feeling it's safe to return to church. Our visa renewal process went smoothly; God heard our prayers and we had no problems. Adria and I recently took another language evaluation and we both improved our scores. I'm thankful for our result and for our amazing teachers. I can now see God's perfect timing and plan in many ways. This year has been difficult and many times we feel like we have been hanging by a thread. All I can figure is that thread is a network of prayer warriors who, despite my inconsistent newsletters, refuse to stop lifting us up to the Father in prayer! Please continue to pray. I am so thankful for you.
